CASE

- An 89 year old lady is admitted to hospital following a fall.
- She is known to have dementia but usually lives alone, mobilises independently around her house and is supported by carers in daily activities of living.
- She is diagnosed with delirium and a pelvic fracture.
- After two days in the acute medical admissions unit she is moved to the elderly care unit in the same hospital.
- That afternoon, her daughter visits her on this ward.





CASE

When her daughter arrives on the ward she finds her mother in a four bedded bay.

- There are bed rails on the bed
- Her mother is crying and clearly distressed
- Her mother is uncovered below the waist
- Her tray is out of reach and there is cold and partially eaten food on it
- There is porridge on the front of her nightdress
- There are three tablets under the bed
- There is no staff member in the bay, only other patients and relatives
